

THE THREE AMIGAS

Last month's newsletter had a story about the three "Annies." This month's story is about "the three Amigas". More specifically the three women who took on the job of costuming the 39 cast members in Community Players stunning, fall production, Annie.

A last-minute change in the production staff brought producer, Kim Cuesta, to the forefront ... accepting the role of costume designer. Kim's career as a physician and Chief of the Pathology Department at Tidal Health often finds her peering through a microscope and managing a great number of people as well as medical specimens. Fortunately, she brought her organizational skills and the same degree of focus and

dedication to this new job.

Kim's first task was to scour the wardrobe collection, pulling clothes that defined the Depression years, particularly 1933, when President Roosevelt introduced the New Deal. The costume plot slowly emerged, moving from the orphanage, to Hooverville, to Daddy Warbuck's palatial mansion, to the streets of NYC, to the radio studio and on to the White House before arriving back at the mansion for the Christmas party. This meant that outside of the orphans, each character had at least three, if not four costume changes, for a grand total of over 100+ costumes!

Early in rehearsals, Kim's husband Pete (Daddy Warbucks), asked if she had seen Jasper on stage that evening. She responded, "Who is Jasper and what costume does he wear? I don't have him in my binder." They both laughed when Jasper was identified as Sandy and everyone agreed that Sandy looked just fine in the fur coat he

came in.

After finding appropriate costumes, many alterations had to be made ... sleeves and hems shortened or lengthened, necklines and waistlines adjusted, buttons moved and adjustments galore. That is when Debby Nagel volunteered her help. Having been the costumer for Kiss Me Kate, she was familiar with large casts and multiple scene changes. Besides being a stickler for details, she also likes to think of the actors as part of a "stage" painting. Coordinating outfits and using color to enhance the "picture."

The next order of business was to outfit the fourteen orphans. Luckily, Sally Ridgway had stitched delightful apron/dresses for an earlier production. Of course, fourteen orphan costumes in the exact sizes of the new cast would have felt like winning the lottery. But by chance, Irina Perkowski, Annie's real mother, came to the rescue and volunteered to reshape and make some new pieces to fit each girl. Kim and Debby

quickly found Irina to be a true gem.

Irina says that she has been sewing forever, as her family in her native Lithuania boasts a lengthy line of skilled seamstresses. So, she set about outfitting the orphans, personalizing each, and adding many features like pockets to hide the treats for Sandy. She was particularly adept at embellishing Annie's costumes, adding fur to her pink coat and making a belt with a bow tie to "spruce up" a plain blue dress. Irina (an RN) and Kim agree that their jobs are often focused on specific duties. So both appreciated that this experience really allowed them to delve into their creative spirits. Irina said, "Watching the orphans on stage, knowing that each of these dresses passed through my hands – whether altered, refashioned, or made from scratch- was incredibly meaningful and special."

So, three women, Teaning on their individual skills and ingenuity, teamed up to create

the vast costume plot envisioned by Kim and director, Sherri Trader Hynes.

Kim, Debby and Irina, the Three Amigas, are so proud of the finished product. As Kim says, "It became a huge labor of love, as beautiful and talented people came together

to create art through wardrobe."

Of course, costuming is only one of the elements of stage production. Set design, lighting, sound, stage management, makeup/wig design all contribute to supporting the story. Community Players is blessed to have wonderfully capable individuals who contribute to the whole.

But our "three Amigas" story highlights the fact that there is always room for more volunteers. No matter how insignificant you might feel concerning your talent or abilities, there is always room for another team player. Come join us and experience the joy of making magic!
